This year’s conference will follow a workshop framework. Through structured peer interactions in grade level workshops led by experienced facilitators, participants will reflect upon their current teaching practices across all subjects, then discuss these with their peers in light of Catholic Liberal Arts teaching principles. The goal is to strengthen each participant’s understanding of Liberal Arts teaching principles and offer practical next steps to develop new practices within the classroom.

A list of most of the Liberal Arts teaching principles we will consider:

- ◆ Socratic discussion and Mimetic teaching
- ◆ Mastering each step rather than rushing through content
- ◆ Memorization helps make learning permanent
- ◆ Educational virtues: cultivating good habits of learning
- ◆ Songs, jingles and chants in the classroom
- ◆ Cultivating restful learning enables deep learning that delights and sustains
- ◆ Wonder and curiosity: cultivating life-long affections for Truth, Goodness & Beauty
- ◆ Rhythms and routines in the classroom that profoundly teach
- ◆ The teacher as mentor and partner with parents
